# Local Elections Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2019

What do councillors do? Councillors are elected to the local council to represent their community, so they must either live or work in the area. Becoming a councillor is both a rewarding and privileged form of public service. They will be in a position to make a difference to the quality of other people's daily lives and prospects. Being an effective councillor requires both commitment and hard work.

Councillors have to balance the needs and interests of residents, stakeholders and other partners and the council. These will all make legitimate demands on a councillor's time, on top of the demands and needs of their personal and professional lives.

While it may be too late to think about whether you want to put yourself forward this time there are still other ways to get involved. If you're interested in finding out more, why not talk to your elected councillor.

And of course, don't forget to exercise your democratic right to vote and get out on polling day!

# **Traditional Vintage** and Craft Market

In spite of windy weather, a dozen hardy traders attended the first new regular Saturday market for Ross-on-Wye. The market will continue every week with stalls offering that unique opportunity to buy those special gifts for friends and family and for treating yourself. Do come along!



Following the most recent Ross Town Council Meeting the latest draft of the Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) has been submitted formally to Herefordshire Council for its internal (Regulation 15) processing, and then public (Regulation 16) consultation.

In the Regulation 14 consultation, 54 people or organisations sent in a total of 284 comments. All these were collated and addressed individually. An anonymised version of the comments and how they were addressed will be available on the Town Council website from early April.

The Chase Hotel site housing allocation included in the NDP for consultation had been overtaken by revised proposals for a larger number of dwellings. However, it was clear that

there was considerable disquiet within the town about the revised proposals involving closure of the Chase Hotel. Because the final stage of the NDP approval process involves a Referendum (approve Plan – or not) it was judged that the risks of overall failure would be too great if the site is included. The plan submitted to Herefordshire Council therefore makes no mention of the Chase Hotel or the surrounding land.

The NDP cannot make specific statements about the continuation of a particular business, but can (and does) include policies that encourage and support areas of economic activity; for example, tourism.

The current, submitted, draft Plan is now available on the Ross Town Council Website.

Next steps will be internal processing by Herefordshire Council and then six weeks of Regulation 16 Consultation which is expected to start the day after the local council elections; i.e. on May 3<sup>rd</sup>. Following that consultation all comments will again be addressed, after which the NDP is submitted for Examination by an external planning inspector; following which any further requests for changes must be made. After which the final Plan enters the prereferendum period of a further 6 weeks. Depending how many comments are made through those processes the Referendum is now expected in early autumn 2019.

## Budget 2019/2020

Work towards budget setting started in earnest last summer with each of the Council's committees looking at their priorities and projects not only for the financial year

commencing in April 2019 but also for the following two years.

There were many ideas coming forward which Members had to consider carefully to ensure their financial viability and any longer term day to day funding implications.

The Council accepted the increase in the budget reflecting the need to grow as a direct result of the additional responsibilities that have come from the assets that have been taken over such as the open spaces along the riverside, the markets, public toilets, Homs Road car park and the Market House amongst them.

The clear evidence of the Council's expanding portfolio is evident as seen in other news items contained within this Newsletter edition.

The Council made a renewed commitment in recognising its responsibilities to maintain the assets and amenities for the benefit of the Town to provide a clean and vibrant environment for residents, visitors and workers.

The annual expenditure budget was set at £547,945 with a precept request of £500,995, the difference being made up from various income streams derived from the Council's activities. This amount represents on a Band D Council tax bill a rise of about 25 pence per household per week which goes directly to the Town Council. ## Arboretum

The Amenities Committee is working with the Council's Tree Warden to identify an area of land at the Ropewalk and Long Acre sites that would be suitable to create a new arboretum.

The Council's Tree Planting Policy recognises that one way to remember the life of a friend or loved one is through the arrangement of a longstanding tribute, a reminder that they are not forgotten and the donation of a tree is often considered on these occasions.

Donating a tree may also be considered to commemorate an anniversary or an historical event, such as the Memorial Oak that was planted recently near the Band Stand in commemoration of the centenary of the end of WWI.

The plan was brought about as the existing area on Caroline Symonds Gardens that has been used for planting memorial trees is beginning to fill up and with the popularity of the scheme the need to identify a new area became necessary.

If you are interested in donating a tree the Council is still receiving applications and you can contact the office for further details.



**Ropewalk Playground** - The committee is looking at schemes for the Ropewalk Playground with a view to starting work later this year.

**Canoe Launch** - We are looking at ways to improve the facility for canoeists and alleviate problems for other users at the Caroline Symonds Gardens and Long Acre in Wye Street.

**Fishing Platforms** - Last year an experimental platform was made using live woven willow spiling to create steps which will both provide a place for fishermen to sit and help prevent erosion to the river bank.

The council is grateful to the Ross Angling Club for financial help towards the creation of further fishing platforms along the river at Long Acre.

**Wild Flower Meadow** - Long Acre has been identified by the Herefordshire Meadows as a suitable site for a pilot scheme to develop the floodplain meadow for which they have received funding.

**St Mary's Church Floodlights** - The Town Council is responsible for the maintenance of the Closed churchyard, i.e. the lawned area surrounding the church. The current floodlights housed in this area are old, don't always work and when they do, use a lot of electricity. The committee began negotiations with the church to look at replacing them and is delighted that the "Friends of St Mary's" have agreed to take on this project and are setting up lighting trials of various LED Floodlights. The results will assist in determining the specification of a replacement lighting scheme.

**Memorial Benches** - We are able to install memorial benches at various locations including along the Rope Walk and Long Acre, in the Ross Town Cemetery, Crossfields and Deanhill Park. If you would like more information on how to go about this, contact the office or look at our website (details on the back page).

Finally, I would say that it has been a pleasure for both Marie and for me to serve the people of Ross this year and I thank you all for that privilege.
