
ROSS-ON-WYE - the birthplace of British Tourism



Must see

Visit the historic Market House, one of the oldest buildings in the centre of town built between 1650 and 1654, and the Made in Ross fine art and craft gallery upstairs, showcasing a wide range of locally made arts and crafts.

Wander up to the beautiful St Mary's Church with its 205 foot high spire and head to The Prospect for breathtaking views over the River Wye.

The Market Square holds weekly markets on Thursdays and Saturdays where you can buy a range of gifts, flowers, crafts, food and drink.

Relax in the Thomas Blake Memorial Gardens, a pretty terraced space overlooking the riverside, opened in 1907 to commemorate one of the town's great benefactors.



Local sculptor Walenty Pytel's three metal sculptures depicting salmon, swans and mallards can be found at the top of Wye Street and on the riverbank.

In good weather enjoy a picnic on the Rope Walk, with its children's play area or take a walk along the riverside's Linear Arboretum. Stop off for a drink and bite to eat at The Hope & Anchor with your four legged friend.

During the summer months, head down to The Bandstand at Caroline Symonds Gardens and enjoy one of the free Sunday afternoon Bands in the Park concerts.



Eat & drink

The Wve Valley is renowned for its local artisan produce from organic meat, vegetables, honey, preserves and crisps to beers, gins and fruit liqueurs. Pick up a wide selection of products from our delicatessens including Truffles on High St or Field Fayre Organics and award winning Hank's Meat & Game on Broad St. The following eateries are in the town centre or a few minutes' walk away.

A little history ...

In 1770, travel writer, William Gilpin, took a tour of the River Wye from Ross to Chepstow and loved the journey so much, he published the UK's first tourist guide called 'Observations on the River Wye'. Now acknowledged as the birthplace of British tourism, Ross-on-Wye is an attractive historic market town, sitting on a rocky outcrop of old red sandstone, overlooking the

Ross is the only town within the boundaries of the Wye Valley Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) and is perfectly located for visiting Herefordshire, Worcestershire and Gloucestershire, including the nearby Forest of Dean and the Brecon Beacons National Park.

The town's key benefactor and philanthropist, John Kyrle known as The Man of Ross - is referenced in many buildings, walks and other historical features throughout the town.

450 AD, has links to an ancient kingdom called Archenfield, and in St Mary's Church, you can see hedgehog icons on family crests dating back to the 17th century.

The town became officially known as Ross-on-Wve in 1931, to distinguish it from the other towns with the same name. With a population of around 11,500, Ross remains a very popular destination for those who enjoy the outdoor life and exploring the area.

Cyclina: There are cycle routes to suit all levels and abilities within a stone's throw of the town - contact the local cycling club (www.rosscc.co.uk) or pop into Revolutions on Broad St for advice and all the equipment you need.

Tennis: Head to Ross Tennis Centre (Walford Road, HR9 5AR) if you fancy a game on one of the four all weather outdoor courts or enjoy a game of table tennis on their outdoor table (bring your own equipment).

Ross Sports Centre: A community hub with activities for all ages and abilities including football, cricket and the recently formed Pétanque Club. Find the popular skatepark next door in Wilton Car Park (Wilton Road HR9 7BY).

Golf: Pack your clubs and enjoy a game on one of the local greens. Try South Herefordshire Golf Club (Upton Bishop HR9 7UA 01989 780535) or Ross-on-Wye Golf Club (Gorsley HR9 7UT | 01989

Outdoor aear:

Trains: Nearest train stations are Ledbury (14 miles). Hereford (15 miles) and Gloucester (20 miles).
